Rationale	 The Ursuline KS3 English curriculum has been mapped to the English Programme of Study: National Curriculum in England. The Year 7 SOLs build on skills taught in KS2 Literacy lessons with a balance across the year of reading, writing and spoken language skills. The skills are consolidated across the Key Stage in the teaching of increasingly challenging texts that cover a range of genres, historical periods and diverse writers. We want students to develop an appreciation and love of reading, and read increasingly challenging texts independently through: reading a wide range of fiction and non-fiction, including whole books, short stories, poems and plays with a wide coverage of genres, historical periods, forms and authors. learning how to read critically and analytically Across KS3 we teach students to write accurately, fluently, effectively and at length for pleasure and information through writing for a wide range of purposes and audiences, including: well-structured formal expository and narrative pieces stories, scripts, poetry and other imaginative writing notes and polished scripts for talks and presentations a range of other narrative and non-narrative texts, including arguments, and personal and formal letters We support students in learning to speak confidently and effectively, including through: using Standard English confidently in a range of formal and informal contexts, including classroom discussion giving short speeches and presentations, expressing their own ideas and learning to keep to the point participating in formal debates and structured discussions, summarising and/or building on what has been said
