






The school received notification this week that we have won two national SSAT Educational Outcomes awards for being in the top 10% of schools nationally for GCSE in both progress and attainment categories. The SSAT team said 'Congratulations to you, your team and your students'. Parenting Resources

Since the airing of Adolescence, parenting and digital experts have been sharing many valuable online safety resources for parents/carers and educators. As always, all valuable resources are added to our extensive 'Keeping Safe Online' library. I invite you to take time out to digest the available resources, and hope they will help you better understand the adolescent landscape and inform conversations around the dinner table.





















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In summary, to keep our children safe, it is essential that they are media literate, can think critically and have boundaries. Normalising difficult conversations and holding open and ongoing discussions within the household around online safety, challenges and dangers, fake news, algorithm bubbles and how to change them, echo chambers and so on is key.

Should you allow your daughter(s)/son to have a smartphone and/or access to social media, we recommend following expert advice and researching apps to understand the dangers and risks before they are allowed, agreeing family rules including family digital contracts, setting up parental controls, screen time, app limits and content & privacy restrictions, enabling Ask to Buy, removing screens from bedrooms especially during homework and overnight, password sharing, regularly checking your child's devices and delaying, avoiding or limiting social media and web browsing.

It is essential that parents get to know the common platforms and how children engage with them, understand more about online cultures and terminology, and talk to your children about what they are engaging with and how it makes them feel. Finally, if you suspect risky behaviour, then contact the school.

The Richard Dimbleby Lecture 2025

Former England football manager Sir Gareth Southgate has delivered the 2025 Richard Dimbleby Lecture. In the lecture, he reflects on his personal journey, what he has lived through and what he has learned as a leader. He explores the concept of belief, examines the power of unity and highlights the importance of resilience, especially for young people (his speech focuses on young men in particular) in a fast-changing and challenging world.
