1. Drug-Related Emojis

Emojis are frequently employed to discreetly reference drug-related topics. Here are some commonly used symbols:

2. Sex-Related Emojis

Certain emojis are employed to convey sexual content or intentions subtly:

Body Parts:

Leggplant) – Male genitalia. → (Banana) – Male genitalia. → (Hot dog) – Male genitalia. → (Peach) – Butt. → (Cherries) – Butt, breasts, and/or testicles. → (Cat) – Female genitalia. → (Taco) – Female genitalia.

3. Crime and Gang-Related Emojis

Emojis can also be utilised to signify involvement in criminal activities:

Weapons and Violence:

¬ (Pistol) / 🌒 (Bomb) / 🔪 (Kitchen Knife) – Represent weapons or violent intentions.

Theft and Illegal Activities:

(Cigarette) /

(Pirate Flag) – May indicate involvement in illegal activities or rebellious behaviour.

4. Incel, Misogyny, and Online Radicalisation

Certain emojis have been adopted by online communities promoting misogyny and radical ideologies.

What is an Incel?

The term **incel** stands for "involuntary celibate," referring to an online subculture of mostly men who believe they are unable to attract romantic or sexual partners despite desiring them. Incels often engage in misogynistic, extremist, or self-deprecating discussions, blaming women and societal structures for their perceived lack of success in relationships. Some incel communities foster toxic ideologies that promote hostility toward women and even advocate for violence.

AUS: Ask us anything

Banana: "Penis"

BTO: "Bathroom time off"

CCW: "Comments and criticism welcome"

CD9: "Code 9" meaning parents are around

CMV: "Change my view"

DAE: "Does anybody else or does anyone else"

DM;HS: "Doesn't matter; had sex"

DPW: "D*** pictures welcome"

DTF: "Down to f***"– which means I want to have sex OR I would like to join you in the plans you suggested. When used in question form it means, do you think he/she would sleep with me or do you think he/she would want to come with us?

DUM: "Do you masturbate?"

DUSL: "Do you scream loud?"

ELI5: "Explain like I'm 5 (years old)"

F2F: "Face-to-Face" meaning FaceTime



FB: "F*** buddy"

FBOI: "F*** boy" meaning a guy looking for sex

FIFY and FTFY: "Fixed It For You" and "Fixed that for you", respectively

FMLTWIA: "F*** me like the w**** I am"

FOL: "Fond of leather"

FOMO (Fear of Missing Out): <u>FOMO</u> is when a student (or adult) experiences anxiety that an exciting event may currently be happening elsewhere, often prompted by posts seen on social media

FR: "For real"

FWB: "Friends with benefits"

FWP: "First world problems"

FYP: "For you page"

GG: "Good game"

GGG: reference to the "Good Guy Greg" or "Good Girl Gina" meme

GIS: "Google Image Search"

GNRN: "Get Naked Right Now"

GOAT: "Greatest of all time!"

GNOC: "Get naked on camera"

GTFO: "Get the f**k out"

GTG: "Got to go"

GYPO: "Get your pants off"

HAK: "Hugs and kisses"

HIFW: "How I feel when"

IIRC: "If I recall correctly"

ILY and ILU: "I love you"

IRL: "In real life"

ISO: "In search of"

ITT: "In this thread"

IYKYK: "If you know you know" meaning an inside joke

JOMO: "Joy of missing out"

KMS: "Kill myself"

KPC: "Keeping Parents Clueless"

KYS: "Kill yourself"



LB: "Like back"

LMAO: "Laugh my a** off"

LMD: "Let me die"

LMIRL: "Let's meet in real life"

LMP: "Like my pic"

LOL: "Laugh out loud"

LoL: "League of Legends", a popular online game

MRW and MFW: "My reaction when" and "My face when", respectively

MOS: "Mom Over Shoulder"

NIFOC: "Naked in front of their computer"

NP: "No problem"

NSFL: "Not safe for life" (explicit and offensive; often gore)

NSFW: "Not safe for work" or inappropriate for minors

OAG: References the "Overly attached girlfriend" meme

OC: "Original content", meaning the author of the post created the content shown or linked in the post or "Open crib", meaning no parents will be at home or at a gathering or party

OFC: "Of course"

OG: Meaning "original" or "original gangster"

OMFG: "Oh my f**king god"

OOTL: "Out of the loop"

OP: "Original poster" meaning the author of the post

P911: "Parent Alert"

PIR: "Parent In Room"



PMOYS: "Put me on your Snapchat"

POS: "Parents over shoulder"

PSA: "Public service announcement"

Pu: "Pull up"

ROTFLMAO: "Rolling on the floor laughing my as* off"

RT: "Retweet"

SALTS: "Smiled a little then stopped"

sksksk: The sound you make when you hit lots of keys at once on your keyboard

Skrt: To stop unexpectedly

SMDH: "Shaking my damn head"

SMH: "Shaking my head" or "that's so dumb"

SFS: "Shoutout for Shoutout"

SO: "Significant other"

STFU: "Shut the f**k up"

SU: "Swipe up/Shut up"

Sus: "Suspect" or "Suspicious"

T: Gossip or talking behind someone's back

TBH: "To be honest"

TDTM: "Talk dirty to me"

TFW: "That feeling when"

TIFU: "Today I f**ked up"

TIL: "Today I learned"

TL;DR: "Too long; Didn't read." Sometimes used as a synonym for "summary"



V: "Very"

WIP: "Work in progress"

WTF: "What the f**k?"

WUF: "Where you from?"

WYA: "Where you at?"

WYD: "What you doing?"

WYLL: "What you look like?"

YASS or YEET: A very strong way to say "yes"

YK: "You know"

YMMV: "Your mileage may vary"

YSK: "You should know"
