Ursuline High School Wimbledon was proudly awarded Outstanding its recent Catholic Schools Inspection (CSI, 2025) - describing our school *"as a community, a family"*.

Students here experience first-hand the positive effects of giving selflessly in service for the Common Good, and see the impact of helping someone in need. We have a comprehensive virtues programme to help students develop the personal qualities needed to be the best versions of themselves.

Our full time Chaplain supports students in their faith journey. Each student is encouraged to use their talents, whether it is in music, drama, dance or ICT, to help others reflect and pray. Celebratory masses are held as well as special services throughout the year. Students support charities, both by raising money and being active in the local community. Year 7 run a community Christmas tea party. Year 8 students participate in a Youth Philanthropy Project, in which the winning group secures £1,500 for a local charity. Year 12 have an extensive enrichment programme - which includes supporting our local homeless shelter, our local foodbank and supporting students in a local special needs school.

There are opportunities for students to attend national events and conferences, and to participate in faith forming activities together with students from other schools. Each year group takes part in a retreat day, in which different themes are developed in relation to personal development and faith.

In 2025, 83% of students achieved at least five 9-4's including English and Maths (at Grade 4) in their Examination Results. 43% of all grades were 7+ and 200 grade 9s were achieved.

TEACHING AND LEARNING

Our goal is to inspire our students to use their knowledge and skills to empower themselves to succeed academically and in the wider context of the world we live in through our broad and balanced curriculum. Our world class teaching and learning provision ensures that our students take pride in their achievements, engage with the learning, and succeed in their ambitions.

Our highly skilled and diverse teaching staff are equipped with the latest pedagogical studies to support their exemplary subject knowledge. We have a clear, research informed policy on the best teaching methods to engage and enthuse our students with a love of learning. We are passionate about our craft and share this with our students.

In all lessons, we aim to develop our students' skills, with particular focus on challenge and deepening the learning through targeted feedback, consolidation and retrieval practice. Student voice is really important to us, and we use this to improve our teaching and learning and to build our curriculum. Additionally, we have an exceptional offer in STEM subjects.

In a world that is rapidly changing, our outward looking approach and continuous innovation in teaching enables us to deliver a modern, global education, which prepares our students to take their place as successful young women.

Every student is set a minimum target. This grade is based on prior attainment at the start of each Key Stage. Termly reports to parents monitor achievement, progress and effort. Parents can access their daughter's progress report on Arbor, the school's Management Information System. Login details are shared with parents when their child starts with us.

Students are grouped according to prior attainment in English and Mathematics. In Science, this occurs in Year 8 onwards. With the Foundation subjects, students are taught in mixed ability groups. Teachers identify groups of individuals who need additional or different activities to challenge and aid learning.

DIGITAL LEARNING

The Digital Age

We creatively use MS Teams for our Virtual Learning Environment to provide more resources, revision materials and further support for our students.

Our vision at Ursuline High School is to enable our students to be future-ready, proficient in the general and specialist skills for learning, life, and work, with exceptional fluency in the language of a globally connected society.

Through the development of key IT skills, we ensure that students can utilise their IT skills at any stage of their education and beyond. We take cyber resilience (safety) very seriously and ensure that our students are able to use IT with a purpose. We use IT to ensure that we are able to enrich and enhance our students' learning.

Through our voluntary donation scheme we enable all students to have a laptop to support their learning in and out of the classroom. Each subject uses IT to further develop students' learning and ensures that they make outstanding progress through a wider range of learning opportunities.

INDIVIDUAL LEARNING NEEDS

SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

At the Ursuline we aim to cater for the individual learning needs of all students, this is in line with the SEND Code of Practice: 0-25 Years. The students identified with additional needs are placed on the Special Educational Needs Register at one of two levels: Educational Health Care Plan or Student with Additional Needs.

There are four broad areas of need in which reasonable adjustments are made to support the young person;

1. Communication and interaction
2. Cognition and learning
3. Social, mental and emotional health
4. Sensory and/or physical

Students who have an EHCP receive extra support and guidance in some of their lessons from Learning Support Assistants, who work in partnership with the subject teacher to help students to access the curriculum. Where appropriate, students may also be withdrawn from some lessons for one to one or small group support on, for example, reading and writing skills, organisational skills and raising self-esteem. All students on the register have a Learning Support Plan to inform subject teachers of the specific learning challenges, so that they can differentiate their work accordingly. Extra support is given to students as deemed necessary and the progress of these students is co-ordinated and monitored by the Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENDCO and the Learning Support Team).

Students on the Special Educational Needs register may also need assessment and support from other professionals. These include the Educational Psychologist, the Learning and Behaviour team and the Social Inclusion Manager. Once again, these referrals are managed by the Learning Support Team.

At the Ursuline High school we fulfil our school values through our outstanding pastoral care. We understand that young women need to have the best view of themselves and the world around them to succeed.

We really do care for each and every one of our students and ensure that their individual needs are known and met. When you start at the Ursuline, you will have a team that you can access to support you with any worries or anxieties you may have, either inside, or outside of school. Our pastoral care starts with your tutor that you see daily and discuss tasks around mindfulness, well-being, and respect. Further support is provided by your pastoral support assistant, who works alongside your Head of Year to give guidance and can help find out the right support for you, from organisation skills to friendship concerns. Beyond that, our focus on health and well-being is at the forefront of our curriculum, and PSHE with your tutor is an excellent way to express and develop your knowledge on physical and mental well-being, as well as how to have successful relationships.

To support the well-being of our students, we offer referrals to the following: a school counsellor, our Well-Being Coordinator, a school nurse and a team of Educational Well-Being Practitioners. External support includes organisations such as Kooth, Off The Record, Catch 22, and St Giles.

MENTAL HEALTH SCHOOL TEAM

Our focus on well-being is further supported by being part of the South-West London Mental Health Teams in Schools (MHTS). This partnership provides mental health support teams that work with students and their parents, with the aim of ensuring they are well equipped to have healthy and honest conversations about emotional well-being, as well as connecting them to local services. This has enabled us to develop the services we have on offer at the Ursuline, such as a clinical psychologist, and education well-being practitioners- who focus on sleep, hygiene, low mood and anxiety issues.



MOBILE PHONES, SMART DEVICES AND SOCIAL MEDIA

We are proud to say we have a clear policy in place regarding the use of phones and smart devices at school: Students are permitted to bring a mobile phone to school for travel purposes, and for year 7 students this must be a traditional 'non-smart' phone only. All phones are to be turned off prior to entering the school site and stored in their locked locker for the duration of the school day. Smart Watches are not allowed on site and must be left at home. Any phone, smart watch or other device seen or heard around the school site, outside of lockers will be confiscated.

In accordance with our Digital Learning & Safety Policy (and the current minimum age of 13), all social media including WhatsApp, TikTok, Snapchat and Instagram will not be tolerated, and there will be consequences for anyone found to be engaging in it inappropriately regardless of whether they are of the legal age.

PERSONAL, SOCIAL, HEALTH EDUCATION (PSHE)

PSHE aims to prepare students to make informed and safe decisions in an ever-changing and unpredictable world. The whole school participates in a dynamic and responsive spiral curriculum, which focuses on relationships, health and well-being and living in the wider world.

We believe in developing the whole person, with students encouraged to use their gifts and talents to serve others working for social justice and human dignity. We aim to empower our students to understand potential risks around them and to safeguard themselves, and each other.

Students need to be empowered to propose and develop enterprising ideas to support the learning of all. As advocates for their own and others' needs, students can increase their confidence, motivation and develop their leadership skills.

Our elected School Council plays an extremely active part in school life. It is the responsibility of the Council to initiate ideas to support students' well-being and learning, respond to proposals from the Senior Leadership Team and raise issues and concerns. Two members of the school council are elected as representative for the Merton Youth Parliament. Students have also been involved in re-designing our school planner and improving teaching and learning this year.

We have implemented student voice groups to consult students on their ideas and plans for moving our school forward. Changes brought about have included the introduction of trousers within our uniform policy, implementing a more ethnically diverse food range in the canteen, and addressing concerns around micro-aggressions, through staff CPD training and student assemblies.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME

We trust and listen to our students, as well as implementing their ideas. Students can impact on our school by applying to become Student Leaders and/or Members of the School Council. The School Council has two representatives from every Tutor Group who meet regularly throughout each school year. Each representative presents their ideas to their peers at the start of the academic year and elections are then held. In recent years, School Council have made improvements to many areas of the school.

We have an increased focus on equity for all and challenging all aspects of discrimination. The school council has also campaigned successfully to help improve the environment within our school, the local community, and globally. This year, we are working towards the CAFOD Live Simply award.

We are also passionate about our Student Leadership Programme, which involves students from years 7-13. Students work in teams on several projects across the school- linked to the priorities in the school improvement plan. The groups are facilitated by staff members but run by the students. Year 10 -12 Student Leaders are assigned to each group and undertake a Leadership Training Programme at the start of the year. They then take responsibility for coordinating the groups, leading meetings, and liaising with the staff facilitator. Students who play a significant role are awarded the SSAT Student Leader Accreditation. Student-implemented projects range across Chaplaincy, Teaching and Learning, Digital Learning, Community, Public Speaking, the school Library, Sports, Arts and Equalities. In the Sixth Form, the Head's Leadership Team act as ambassadors, speaking at a range of events. They also lead prefects and support students across the school in their own personally devised project.

OUR FACILITIES

Food Technology

We have a campus that facilitates the optimum learning environment, from specialist rooms for Food Technology lessons to our library and tranquil quad area, which contains outdoor seating for chatting with friends during break time. We have a school supported laptop programme to assist students with learning at school and home. Our library is well stocked – with over 12,000 books for the students, and our refurbished St Angela's Centre houses our drama, art, and music rooms, with an impressive gallery. We also have two dining halls and two dedicated areas for sixth form.

We have recently improved the safeguarding and security around the school, St Angelas has had new gates, fencing and enhanced entry system and the main school has a new fire alarm systems in the Sixth Form and Sports Hall. With your continued support, we can keep improving facilities throughout the school.

URSULINE HIGH SCHOOL PLAYING FIELDS *at Morley Park*

Our motto, *Serviam - I will serve*, is at the heart of our school ethos and we are strongly committed to promoting a culturally inclusive school environment, through our ethos, curriculum, school visits, relationships with parents, and links with partners in the local and global community. Our commitment to equality is at the heart of our ethos. Our strategy and action plan impacts all aspects of school life to ensure we continue to address inequalities.

Performances and events such as the annual school production, *St Cecilia Concert*, Art Exhibitions and Multicultural Evening provide opportunities for parents and students to celebrate both the arts and our diverse community. We have been a Lead School for the Government's Mental Health Trailblazer for the past few years. We support both students and the NHS in delivering expert support.

Our **Avila Partnership** with *St Philomena's Catholic High School for Girls* is a commitment to sustaining outstanding Catholic Girls' education through shared practice, and leadership and development. Recently providing a Catholic Formation Programme for Catholic primary and secondary schools in the Southwark Diocese, with the hope that shared good practice will improve the academic and spiritual life of our students. At Ursuline High School, we strive to understand each individual's potential through one-to-one careers sessions and linking the curriculum to the labour market. We ensure all aspects of a student's school life are taken into consideration when supporting them onto further or higher education, training or employment. Students are encouraged to see the bigger picture and keep their options open throughout their time in sixth form, to ensure they have choices when selecting the appropriate career path.

We provide person-centred, impartial and confidential careers advice. It is integrated into students' experience of the whole curriculum and is based on a partnership with students and their parents or carers. We promote equality of opportunity, celebrate diversity and challenge stereotypes. Our policy is shaped by the Gatsby benchmarks identifying the elements of good practice in careers guidance. We have been awarded the Quality in Careers Mark in July 2025.

EMPLOYERS

It is imperative that all students have encounters with employers and experience the workplace. We are committed to preparing all students with the employability skills needed for a global economy. We build on students' teamwork, communication and investigative and adaptability skills to help prepare them for the world of work.

EVENTS

The Ursuline arranges a variety of events and activities from Year 7 through to Year 13. At these events, students can meet representatives from the world of work, further and higher education, voluntary organisations and former students, for inspiration and guidance in a wide range of industry sectors.

Regular events involve external participants, including STEM ambassadors, workplace trips, networking events, conferences, workshops and career panels, with both employers and alumnae. All our events aim to motivate our students by opening their eyes to the opportunities available to them when they leave school, and by enabling them to understand the connection between what they learn at school and the contribution it makes to success in their futures.

OUR CAREERS PROGRAMME

The Careers Lead and other members of the careers team are available in the well-resourced careers library to advise and support every student. Students can ask for information and guidance or can make an individual appointment. There is an extensive careers programme in place from Years 7-13, where students explore the world of work and develop their understanding of employability skills, hear from speakers and interview employers. In Year 10, preparation is made to create a formative pathway for sixth form, college or apprenticeships. In Year 11, every student has at least one careers interview and completes work experience to enable them to apply the skills they have learned in school to a real work environment. Year 11 are provided with opportunities to explore higher education options, with university trips, including Bath and Royal Holloway.

In the sixth form, students are supported in applications to universities, degree apprenticeships, college applications and work placements. Group workshops include personal statement clinics and decoding the UCAS application process. All students are helped in achieving their desired pathway.

We strongly encourage students to consider STEM, digital and green pathways, as well as other growth industries, through extra-curricular clubs and student conferences. We also have established links with several Russell Group universities, including Oxford, Cambridge, UCL, Imperial and Kings' College and we work with medical schools. We are on a partnership programme with Exeter University. We host external speakers in all fields and are continually developing and expanding our relationships with a wide variety of industries and sectors. Parents are warmly encouraged to get involved and offer support.

Across this programme, students engage with professionals from diverse organisations and professions. Extended learning is achieved by providing opportunities and enrichment across the curriculum and year groups through a range of strategies, from conferences in school, corporate visits, speakers, our SERVIAM and careers programme, as well as taking students to a great number of events hosted in and around London and further afield.

PROVIDING OPPORTUNITIES

Our aim is that students leave the Ursuline as young women who have the confidence, skills, character and drive for success, to go and live out all that they have learnt about service and leadership. Learning from female role models, including our amazing alumnae, parents, and other professionals from all walks of life, develops students' skills for employment and raises their aspirations. Our recent politics conference was on "2026 Brexit Britain; 10 years on" and our International Women's Day conference was "Redefining Strength". Both of these were rated very highly by the students who feed back on how impactful the speakers are and how they enjoy the discussion these conferences initiate.

Extended learning enables our students to understand the relevance to their future of what they learn in their lessons now, and gives them the knowledge and skills they need to be prepared for life after school, in both ongoing education and employment. Year 12s have the opportunity to present at conferences which is a great experience for them- our annual politics conference is attended by eight different schools, a panel of around eight speakers, and 200 students attending, whilst our International Women's Day is focused on our own students and alumnae, and is a celebration of all the wonderful ways in which Ursuline students go on to make an impact in the world. We partner with many different organisations to offer the best possible provision for our sixth-form. These include: Wimbledon Bookfest, the Jack Petchy Foundation, CapCo, Rare, TEAM Global, Balliol College Oxford, Merton College Oxford, Churchill College Cambridge, Mulberry School for Girls, the Ursuline Education Network, Ursuline Links, the UEC, King's College Wimbledon and the Guardian Newspaper.

Students who join us in the sixth-form have told us that our enrichment programme stood out to them as very special, and we take great pride in what it offers the students.

With the support of a dedicated Careers Programme and our Careers Advisor, Ursuline Sixth Form prepares students for University, Apprenticeships and for long term career progression. We foster and support independent learning skills and provide one to one specialist support to gain places on students' chosen pathways.

OXBRIDGE & MEDICS PROGRAMMES

The Sixth Form offers tailored support for those students applying to university, including specific support for Russell Group and a dedicated Oxbridge Programme, with events, speakers, trips, weekly classes, and mock interviews. We usually have about 15 students who apply to Oxbridge each year, choosing a wide range of subjects, from Natural Sciences at Cambridge to History and Politics at Oxford. Our Medics Programme supports our aspiring Medics through the demanding application process and are successful in many students being made offers in this highly competitive field.

COMMUNITY

Students actively contribute to the school community and are invited to participate in leadership training in school council, chaplaincy programmes and community service. Our programme of enrichment includes Science Gold Crest Award, Guardian Young Reporters Scheme, Covent Garden Business Challenge, Duke of Edinburgh, Sport, Art, and Music projects with other schools, as well as many opportunities for volunteering. There are (ordinarily) opportunities for travel through cultural enrichment trips and language exchange programmes, including Barcelona, New York, Beijing, and Dallas.
