

Noughts & Crosses is a series of young adult novels, by English author Malorie Blackman, including three novellas, set in a fictional dystopia. The series describes an alternative history in which African people had gained a technological and organisational advantage over the European people, rather than the other way around, with Africans having made Europeans their slaves. The series takes place in an alternative 21st-century Britain.

With such a vast array of books at our fingertips what better way to create our very own festive tree? With special thanks to Ava & Devon, 7F for their creative festive ideas.



This is our online library system where students can not only use this at school to borrow library books from the school LRC, but they can also access the reading cloud at home on desktop computers, laptops, iPad and even mobile phones!

The idea of the Reading Cloud is to allow students to read at home by accessing a large collection of premium eBooks, which are available on computers and devices like smartphones and tablets, anytime, anywhere!

Accessing the Reading Cloud

If you've forgotten how to log on, just follow these easy steps:

- Go to the school website
- Click on the About Us Tab and select Learning Resource Centre (LRC)
- Once in the LRC section scroll down and click on the New Library system link
- To Login you will need:
- Username: Your School Email
- Password: Date of Birth in 8 digits (eg. 01012001)

- Search, reserve or download resources across the Reading Cloud
- Recommend resources to other students: Write or video online book reviews (reviewed by administrator)
- Work collaboratively within the Reading Cloud community
- Enjoy a wide range of both publisher and author digital media
- Blog about your favourite books and authors
- Develop your literacy skills through all curriculum subjects. Catalogue your own books and resources in "My Home Library"
- Share your Book, Author and Profile "Likes" with the Reading Cloud community
- Access the Reading Cloud through mobile technologies




WAS...Legend by Marie

future and what may happen in a totalitarian society.




MY FAVOURITE CHARACTER FROM A




THE BOOK THAT GOT ME THROUGH A DIFFICULT TIME


